The regular meeting of the Town of Brusly was held this date, June 14, 2010 at the Brusly Town Hall.

Council Member Olinde led the Pledge of Allegiance. A roll call determined the following officials present:

A motion to approve the minutes of the Town’s regular meeting of May 10, 2010, was made by Council Member Kershaw and seconded by Council Member André. Motion passed with a unanimous vote.

**Planning and Zoning Committee:**

The family of Lucille Fourroux, ET ALS notified the Town of its intention to appeal the declaration of their property located at 240 E. Main St. as derelict and condemned. Before beginning the appeal, Mayor Normand read aloud a letter from Attorney Thomas Acosta, Jr. stating his representation of the Hebert/Fourroux family predating his being appointed Brusly Town Attorney and therefore he was recusing himself from giving the Town advice in the matter. The Mayor also read aloud a letter written by him to the Lucille Fourroux ET ALS notifying them of the Town declaring the three buildings, located at 240 E. Main St., as derelict and condemned. Mr. Rodney Varnell spoke on behalf of the family stating the intention of the family was to tear down the buildings. Mr. Varnell requested more time for the family to come to a consensus and sign the legal documents. After some discussion, a motion to table for rehearing until the September 13, 2010 meeting under the condition

**Fire Department Report:**

Fire Chief Alleman gave the Fire Chief’s report for May. There were seven (7) first aid calls inside the Town and seven (7) outside of Town. There were no fires inside or outside of Town. There was one (1) false alarm, one smoke odor, one (1) grass fire, four (4) trash fires, two (2) gas leaks and two (2) motor vehicle crashes. There was one (1) mutual aid fire call to Port Allen. The total calls for the month were twenty six (26). The total for the year is one hundred thirty two (132).

**Police Department Report:**

Report for the month of May was given by Chief Whaley. There were eight (8) wrecks, eighteen (18) bench warrant arrests, three (3) DWI arrests, one (1) battery, two (2) damage to property, two (2) thefts, one (1) burglary, eight (8) alarms, sixteen (16) assists to other agencies, three (3) 911 calls, one (1) drug arrest, twelve (12) juvenile matters, ten (10) traffic arrests, thirty two (32) miscellaneous calls and one (1) domestic call. For the month’s total, there were 118 calls, 214 citations and 269 violations.

Mayor Normand discussed the unacceptable performance of the local Wal-Mart with the Louisiana Division Manager. Mayor Normand gave a brief Census update, expressing his satisfaction with the communication and cooperation between the Town and the Census Bureau.

Upon the request of a member of the public, Mayor Normand gave an update on sewer pump repairs being done in Town. Fire Chief Alleman announced the return of Firefighter Brett Cavalier from overseas duty, stating he would return to duty with the Fire Department August 1<sup>st</sup>. Chief Alleman attended the Fire Arson Convention in New Orleans where Asst. Fire Chief Hunts was elected President of the organization. Council Member Bourgeois announced the Town’s 6<sup>th</sup> year of Tree City Status. Council Member Bourgeois spoke about the updates being done to the display cases in the Centennial Room of the Town Hall.

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity. Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

Microbial Contaminants - such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife.

Inorganic Contaminants - such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial, or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming.

Pesticides and Herbicides - which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban storm water runoff, and residential uses.

Organic Chemical Contaminants – including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban storm water runoff, and septic systems.

Radioactive Contaminants – which can be naturally-occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

A Source Water Assessment Plan (SWAP) is now available from our office. This plan is an assessment of a delineated area around our listed sources through which contaminants, if present, could migrate and reach our source water. It also includes an inventory of potential sources of contamination within the delineated area, and a determination of the water supply's susceptibility to contamination by the identified potential sources. According to the Source Water Assessment Plan, our water system had a susceptibility rating of 'MEDIUM'. If you would like to review the Source Water Assessment Plan, please feel free to contact our office at the number provided in the following paragraph.

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. WBR WWKS District #2 is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. Information on lead in drinking water, testing methods, and steps you can take to minimize exposure is available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline or at HYPERLINK "http://www.epa.gov/safewater/lead" http://www.epa.gov/safewater/lead.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. Food and Drug Administration regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water which must provide the same protection for public health. We are pleased to report that our drinking water is safe and meets Federal and State requirements. We want our valued customers to be informed about their water utility. The Louisiana Department of Health and Hospitals - Office of Public Health routinely monitors for constituents in your drinking water according to Federal and State laws. The tables that follow show the results of our monitoring during the period of January 1st to December 31st, 2009. Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk.

In the tables below, you will find many terms and abbreviations you might not be familiar with. To help you better understand these terms, we've provided the following definitions:

Non-Detects (ND) – laboratory analysis indicates that the constituent is not present.

Parts per million (ppm) or Milligrams per liter (mg/L) – one part per million corresponds to one minute in two years or a single penny in \$10,000.

Parts per billion (ppb) or Micrograms per liter (ug/L) – one part per billion corresponds to one minute in 2,000 years, or a single penny in \$10,000,000.

Parts per trillion (ppt) or Nanograms per liter (ng/L) – one part per trillion corresponds to one minute in 2,000,000 years, or a single penny in \$10,000,000,000.

Parts per quadrillion (ppq) or Picograms per liter (pg/L) – one part per quadrillion corresponds to one minute in 2,000,000,000 years or one penny in \$10,000,000,000,000.

Picocuries per liter (pCi/L) – picocuries per liter is a measure of the radioactivity in water.

Millirems per year (mrem/yr) – measure of radiation absorbed by the body.

Million fibers per liter (MFL) – million fibers per liter is a measure of the presence of asbestos fibers that are longer than 10 micrometers.

Nephelometric Turbidity Unit (NTU) – nephelometric turbidity unit is a measure of the clarity of water. Turbidity in excess of 5 NTU is just noticeable to the average person.

Variations & Exemptions (V&E) – State or EPA permission not to meet MCL or a treatment technique under certain conditions.

Action level (AL) – the concentration of a contaminant that, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements that a water system must follow.

Treatment technique (TT) – a treatment technique is a required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.

Maximum contaminant level (MCL) – the "Maximum Allowed" MCL is the highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCL's are set as close to the MCLG's as feasible using the best avail-

able treatment technology.

Maximum contaminant level goal (MCLG) – the "Goal" is the level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to human health. MCLG's allow for a margin of safety.

Maximum residual disinfectant level (MRDL) – The highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.

Maximum residual disinfectant level goal (MRDLG) – The level of a drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contaminants.

During the period covered by this report we had below noted violations of drinking water regulations.
